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As I walked the school that morning visiting TA classes and observing their work on these projects, I was struck by how well everyone was getting along. STUDENT COUNCIL


Earlier this month, several of our Student Council members met with 6th grade classes during a team meeting to give them an overview of Student Council and to invite students to apply to be a Student Council member. The Student Council members had the following to say about the application process. "For the application, you have to get a recommendation from a teacher and a friend. You have to answer questions about what you would contribute to Student Council and what ideas you have for change." In an interview with two of our


members, Carter and Stephan, they shared the seriousness of being a Student Council representative. "As a member you have to be committed to getting the work done. The position is not for everybody." The group is dedicated to supporting projects that enhance the school experience for the full student body. Each year Student Council sponsors two Spirit Weeks, Pennies for Patients fundraiser, and school dances. They have been instrumental in bringing restorative practices to CMS by partnering with the Essex Junction Community Justice Center. This year they are also taking on the yearbook and working with a parent volunteer and the assistant principal in this endeavor.

FOCUSING ON SAFETY

On Monday, December 2nd, we held a school fire drill. This drill was not well executed by our students. While the expectation is for students to walk silently and in single file both out of and back into the building, these expectations were not adhered to by many of our students. In response, we asked for our local firefighters and police officer to attend our school wide town meeting held last Wednesday morning. They spoke to our students about the purpose of the fire drills and why it is important for us to follow the expectations of single file and silent while leaving and reentering the school building. Our students were an attentive audience. As always, it is our intention to teach and reteach as necessary expectations for behavior in all situations. We felt that by having our local safety personnel here to deliver the message might be more powerful for our students. We ask that you please speak with your children about the importance of following the expectations during a safety drill.

U MATTER LEADERSHIP TRAINING



This year we have a group of eight students who participated in U Matter Leadership Training last month. This training is for middle and high school students who want to bring awareness and find solutions for mental health issues within their school setting. Students who attended the conference are now making plans with the support of Kara Pawlusiak, one of our school counselors, to decide how to use the information they learned to support mental health awareness at CMS. While still in the early stages of their planning, the group is considering building a website with helpful resources on suicide prevention as well as other

mental health topics. The group is hoping to incorporate information on the following areas they learned about at the conference into their project: suicide prevention/helping a friend who is considering suicide, growth mindset, and managing stress.

CELEBRATION CORNER

Eve Stirling, one of our 6th Grade students, was recently chosen as the 2019 Patriot's Pen Essay Contest winner. This concert was sponsored by the Veterans of Foreign War Post 6689 in Essex Junction. The theme this year was "What Makes America Great?" Her winning essay will be sent on to the state level competition. At the local level, Eve was awarded a certificate and check for \$50. She will be recognized at a Scholarship Awards Dinner in early December.
