Board Questions for Meeting from Community

Mr. Wilson:

Questions:

1. "How can you submit budget increase after budget increase given the declining enrollment and the economic climate that we have experienced in recent years?"

Response:

FTE's & Enrollments: We have made reductions to our FTE's in all schools over the past 8 years as enrollments declined. Currently, our enrollments are increasing at the K-2 level and we have added teachers to our Kind. classrooms. In addition, our EEE program (early educ. programs-required) has substantially increased, or doubled, over the past several years which prompted more early ed. teachers being hired. Again, required programs. Sp. Ed. needs have increased as well with more students eligible and the severity of the students requiring more support at all levels. Again, these are entitlement programs making it mandatory to provide services. It is notable that in many cases we have shifted resources and funding to offset the increases to the voter budget. Example: Behavior specialist funding is from .50 Guidance position and Medicaid dollars.

Education costs in VT are high in comparison to other states. It is important to note that CSD per pupil spending is below the statewide average and well below other district in Chittenden County.

2. "Will you alter the budget request to phase in the computer request over 3 years, hold the line on teacher increases, and reduce positions in total until the student teacher ratio is at least 15."

Response:

The computer device program is a "phase-in" program over the next several years. We are starting with grades 7-9 and plan to expand each year after. Student/Teacher ratios are based on all teachers in schools to all students. This means that art, music, p. ed., nurse, school counselors, etc. are counted. These are required positions. The core classroom teachers have anywhere from 18 to 25 students in their classrooms. What teachers would you recommend removing and how will you respond to the requirements under state law to provide the program?
